- Original purpose (Wilcock & Townsend, 2014): To help occupational therapists identify injustices affecting individuals and communities in a busy practice day.
- Revised purpose (Sy et al. 2021): To aid in identifying determinants that characterize a person or group's ability to engage in a variety of daily occupations, ability to exercise basic human rights within a certain context, and inability to participate due to existing occupational injustices.

- to supplement clinical data to help in the assessment, intervention, and outcome measurement processes
- to facilitate contextual story-telling, an emancipatory approach, advocacy and self-advocacy
- to translate people's abstract ideas into concrete issues and goals


Relevance in practice

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Sustainability

The OJHQ has been used in several practice and research projects since its first use in 2017. We outline below the projects done, present projects, and future plans of the OJHQ:
